How eCLIPS supports all ages and stages

eCLIPS caters for all students. Each of the 23 job groups has a leaflet called 'The basics...'. This gives a simple overview of the sector and is particularly helpful for younger students and those with SEND. In addition, all the careers leaflets have a summary leaflet; these have standard headings and provide bite-sized information for those with limited time or for reluctant readers. The full leaflets provide in-depth information and links enabling further exploration.

eCLIPS lesson plans

Choosing Year 8/9 options (35-60 minutes)

This lesson gets students thinking about the subjects they want to study at GCSE and exploring the career options subjects can lead to. Starting at Education / GCSEs they will browse via related leaflets to choose a job leaflet to read in either the full or summary version (as appropriate). They will look at the labour market information for their chosen job to see how many people do this job, where the jobs are and the average salary. Students will be asked to write down details of their chosen job, save the leaflet and email it to themselves for future reference. See the full lesson plan.

Careers exploration for Years 7-13 (35-50 minutes)

This lesson helps students become familiar with using eCLIPS to explore careers. Students start at Careers / Careers with school/college subjects where they choose one subject leaflet to read. They then explore further using Careers / Job groups and browse via related leaflets to choose a job leaflet to read in either the full or summary version (as appropriate). They will look at the labour market information for their chosen job to see how many people do this job, where the jobs are and the average salary. Students will be asked to write down details of their chosen job, save the leaflet and email it to themselves for future reference. See the full lesson plan.

Choosing careers for Years 7-13 (40-60 minutes)

This lesson uses the Career Wizard tool to find careers that match the qualifications students are aiming for (or have already achieved); the subjects and skills they would like to use in a job; the working environment; and people they would like to work with. From the results, students choose one **job leaflet** that interests them to read and save. They will look at the labour market information for their chosen job to see how many people do this job, where the jobs are and the average salary. Students will then choose one of the related leaflets to read and write down details of their chosen job. Finally they will email saved leaflets to themselves for future reference. Gatsby Benchmark

Benchmark 2:

Learning from career and labour market information

Every pupil, and their parents, should have access to good quality information about future study options and labour market opportunities. They will need the support of an informed adviser to make best use of available information.

Benchmark 3:

Addressing the needs of the pupil

Pupils have different career guidance needs at different stages. Opportunities for advice and support need to be tailored to the needs of each pupil. A school's careers programme should embed equality and diversity considerations throughout.

Benchmark 4:

Linking curriculum learning to careers

All teachers should link curriculum learning with careers. STEM subject teachers should highlight the relevance of STEM subjects for a wide range of future career paths.

Benchmark 7:

Encounters with further and higher education

All pupils should understand the full range of learning opportunities that are available to them. This includes both academic and vocational routes and learning in schools, colleges, universities and in the workplace.
